## Speak to planning committee from home

If you want to speak about a planning application at a Wealden Council Committee, you can now do it via computer. You register when the agenda is published, usually a week before, as if you were attending in person. You will be sent a link, using Microsoft Teams, and should join the meeting at least ten minutes before your appointed time.

• A planning inspector has overturned Wealden's objections to a 190-house estate from developers Croudace on the east side of Uckfield, at Bird-in-Eye Hill, along the B2102. The inspector said the benefits of the scheme outweighed its harms, granting planning permission with conditions.

from 8am on Wednesday 27th August until 6pm on Sunday 1st September.


## Very good darts

## Fun on the Green

Ringmer's Picnic on The Green happens today, Bank Holiday Monday, organised by the Parish Council. There'll be pizza, baked potatoes, waffles and ice-cream; and music from Skull Drummery and Rock Choir East Sussex, plus line dancing with Steps Dance Club. It starts at 1pm.
